


**LAKE CITY RECREATION CENTER:** Name assumed from pioneer RR Sta: "LAKE". Site had been King County Park #31 until it was "id" in 1953 to the Lake City Lions Club for "recreation purposes." In 1955 the Club built the original portion of the Center and staffed it to provide recreation for youth. (At the NW corner of 28<sup>th</sup> + 125<sup>th</sup> was the first school in the district, built in 1914 and abandoned in 1954 upon construction of the school across 125<sup>th</sup>. (In 1954 the district was annexed to Seattle.) Upon community petition and with approval of The Planning Commission the school property was purchased in 1958 (\$19,500=) but the school building was not suitable for recreation purposes so it was boarded up and playground equipment installed in the "schoolyard". In 1964 the Lions Club gave their property with the Center, to the City on the condition that the Department sell the old school site to the Library and the \$50,000= from the sale be used to enlarge and remodel the Center's improvements which actually cost '\$56,341=.

[**WILL ROGERS MEMORIAL** - placed at the Library in 1966 when the Polo Field it had marked SE of 15<sup>th</sup> + 137<sup>th</sup> was developed into residences. The community had petitioned this Dept. to "accept" the shaft + medallion (Alonzo Lewis, sc.) Rogers had starred at Polo Field.]

**ALBERT DAVIS PARK:** Responding to community petition; play area adjacent to the Center was named in 1972 to honor a leading citizen of the Lake City community: Albert Davis (1890-1971). Born in Buffalo, NY, he was a member of the Keystone Kops then charter member of Lake City Vigilantes, originated annual salmon barbecue (w/ his own "Indian Secret Seasoning") of Lake City Pioneer Days Celebration, prime mover at the Youth Center, portrayed Santa Claus for 8 years - loved children everyday -, unofficial goodwill ambassador-mayor of Lake City, awarded the Golden Acorn by the PTA in 1971, just before a fatal cerebral hemorrhage.
