About the Seattle Ethics and Elections Commission

The Commission is a seven-member, citizen body that interprets, administers and enforces the Seattle Elections Code, Ethics Code, Election Pamphlet Code, Lobbying Code, and Whistleblower Protection Code. Three members are appointed by the Mayor; three are appointed by the City Council and the seventh is appointed by the other six. All seven are confirmed by the City Council. The term of office for a commissioner is three years.

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Biennial Report of Election Financing

The SEEC publishes a report after each municipal election cycle showing the money raised to promote or oppose candidates and ballot issues.

Information on the contributions to, and expenditures by, candidates and ballot issue committees is available on the Commission's web site at seattle.gov/elections.

Transition to District Elections

In 2013, the voters amended the City Charter to elect seven of the nine City Councilmembers by district. In 2015, all nine council positions were on the ballot. In 2017, the two at-large (citywide) positions were on the ballot. The district positions will appear on the ballot in the next election cycle in 2019.

Introduction to Democracy Voucher Program

In 2015, the voters passed the Honest Elections Initiative which brought Seattleites a first in the world public financing program, called Democracy Vouchers. The initiative also reduced the contribution limit for City candidates from \$700 to \$500, and placed restrictions on certain persons who contract with the City or who pay someone to lobby on their behalf.

The Democracy Voucher Program was implemented in the 2017 election cycle for candidates running for City Attorney and City Council. Candidates for mayor will be able to participate in the next mayoral election in 2021.

The Honest Elections Initiative appears to have had an impact on those who participate in Seattle elections. The charts and tables in this year's report will show greater numbers of contributors, lower average contributions, more contributions coming from inside Seattle and the source of contributions spread more equitably across the City.




Three City Council candidates – William Sean Beavers, Amanda Carter, and Angelina De Caracena – filed an initial report without designating a Council position. They did not complete the filing process, nor did they raise or spend funds.

City Council Contests

With the start of the Democracy Voucher Program came historic levels of contributions. Although there were only 15 City Council candidates who appeared on the ballot – as opposed to 47 two years ago – there were more contributors than at any point since the Commission began tracking campaign financing 25 years ago. The contribution limit fell to \$500 in 2017, accounting for the disappearance of contributions of more than \$500.




For the second time in three election cycles, the majority of campaign contributions collected by City Council candidates came from those who contributed less than \$100.



Average Contributions


The average contribution size fell to a level not seen since the early 1990s, and less than half of what it was for all but one of the last six election cycles.


Geographic distribution of contributors

Contributors to City Council candidates were spread more evenly across the City than in previous years. Notably, the percentage of contributors from outside Seattle dropped from almost 29 percent to 7 percent in just two years.



The Mayor's Race

The number of contributors in the Mayor's race continued to climb for the third cycle in a row. The contribution limit fell to \$500 in 2017, which explains the lack of contributions of more than \$600 this year.




Percentage of Contributors to Mayoral Races contributing in High, Medium, Low Range

This chart showing contributors (as opposed to contributions) accounts for the fact that the maximum contribution limit has changed over the years – from \$600 in 2001, \$650 in 2005, \$700 in 2009 and 2013, to \$500 in 2017.

The bottom (green) line shows people contributing at the maximum level regardless of the limit at the time. The mid-range contributors (red) line shows those who contributed between \$100 and the contribution limit, and the low-range (blue) line shows those who contributed less than \$100.




Contributions to Mayoral Candidates by Contribution Size


Average Contribution to Mayoral Campaigns

The average contribution to Mayoral campaigns dropped below \$200 for the first time since 2001, to \$173 in 2017. Note that the contribution limit fell from \$700 to \$500 in 2017. The nearly 29 percent drop in the limit corresponds closely to the nearly 28 percent drop in the average contribution size.




Geographic distribution of contributors

This chart shows that the contributors to Mayoral candidates are not as evenly distributed across the City as were contributors to City Council candidates in 2017. The percentage of contributors from outside Seattle was more than three times the level for City Council candidates.




Independent Expenditures in Mayoral Races

Independent expenditures in the Mayor's race have quintupled since 2009.



Independent Expenditures to Council Campaigns

In 2017, total dollars in independent expenditures benefitting or opposing City Council candidates dropped by half compared to 2015; not surprising since there were nine City Council races in 2015 and two in 2017. In 2015, independent expenditures were made on behalf of 12 City Council candidates. In 2017, they were made on behalf of four City Council candidates. In all, 62% of independent expenditures were made on behalf of candidates who won their election.
