SEATTLE INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL LAUNCHES SIFFX THIS JUNE SIFFX

CAN B.C.'S FILM INCENTIVE CHANGES HELP WASHINGTON'S FILM INDUSTRY?

Last year Washington State turned away a potential \$65 million in economic activity provided by filmmakers. Washington State currently caps tax credits for the film industry at \$3.5 million, in comparison nearby Vancouver B.C has no cap - sending many productions that would otherwise shoot here in Washington to our northern neighbors and elsewhere. State film proponents are hoping a change in Vancouver's tax credit system, and more support from local government can help change this.

This year's festival featured 227 films from 33 states and 25 countries, with directors ranging from 5 to 24-years-old. 
Matt Ross' *Captain Fantastic*, which was filmed entirely in Washington State, will be just one of the 421 films that will screen at this year's Seattle International Film Festival, which runs May 19 to June 12. The film's star, Viggo Mortensen, will be presented with the festival's "Outstanding Achievement in Acting Award," and will be interviewed at the SIFF Egyptian. Period comedies will bookend this year's festival, with Woody Allen's *Cafe Society* on opening night and Joceylyn Moorehouse's *The Dressmaker* closing out the festival.



SEATTLE FILMMAKERS' DOCUMENTARY "MILLENNIALS" DEBUTS

THREE LOCAL CLUBS MAKE LIST OF 100 GREATEST AMERICAN MUSIC VENUES

CONSEQUENCE OF SOUND

Neumos, The Crocodile, and The Showbox are cited as some of the country's most vital concert halls on Consequence of Sound's list of "100 Greatest American Music Venues." These three Seattle music institutions came in at numbers 57, 39, and 21 respectively. The Gorge Amphitheater also rounds out the Top 10 spots on the list, coming in at number 9.



SEATTLE COMPOSER AND PIANIST WINS MAJOR AWARD

Seattle composer and pianist Wayne Horvitz has been awarded \$275,000 from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation. Horvitz's work spans many genres, from jazz to rock to modern classical. His most recent major composition, "Some Places Are Forever Afternoon," was inspired by Seattle poet Richard Hugo. Horvitz was one of eight jazz artists to win.
