**Topic**

Barricaded Subjects

**Summary**

- It was alleged that the named employee failed to de-escalate by entering the basement of a building in which a subject was allegedly barricaded.

**Analysis**

- SPD Policy 8.100<sup>1</sup> provides officers with guidance on de-escalation tactics to reduce the need for force through emphasizing communication, time, distance, and shielding. It discusses “placing barriers” between uncooperative subjects and sworn employees but does not define when a subject is “barricaded.”
- SPD Policy 15.080<sup>2</sup> provides three criteria to determine when SWAT should be called for barricaded subjects but does not provide guidance on how to determine whether a subject is barricaded or if SWAT must be called for all situations involving barricaded subjects.
- OPA’s Investigation found that in the absence of an SPD policy that clearly defines whether a subject is barricaded, officers could have different reasonable interpretations on this issue.
- SPD’s Force Review Board recently issued an FRB Action for SPD’s policy unit to provide, “a clear definition of ‘barricaded subject’ in the SPD manual.”<sup>3</sup>
- A report from the IACP defines a barricaded individual and differentiates between barricaded subjects and suspects. It recommends agencies develop a process for assessing whether an individual is barricaded, outlining four steps of related intelligence and information gathering.<sup>4</sup>
- OPA reviewed policies from comparable cities.

- San Francisco has a specific hostage and barricaded subject policy which defines barricaded suspect incidents with several characteristics (see GO 8.02).<sup>5</sup>
- Spokane defines a barricaded subject, provides specific factors to consider when preparing for a barricaded situation, and outlines supervisor responsibilities.”<sup>6</sup>
- Denver provides a checklist for officers to use when verifying incidents meet the definition of barricaded, including “(1) The suspect has committed or is reasonably suspected of having committed a criminal act. (2) There is a good reason to believe the suspect is armed. (3) The suspect poses a potential threat to the lives of others. (4) The suspect is secreted in a position of advantage. (5) The suspect has refused to submit to arrest or has refused to respond to attempts at contact.”<sup>7</sup>
- Los Angeles advises officers to call SWAT to address barricade/hostage situations, “when the suspect is probably armed; the suspect is believed to have been involved in a criminal act or is a significant threat to the lives and safety of the public and/or police; the suspect is in a position of advantage, affording cover and concealment or is contained in an open area and the presence or approach of police officers could precipitate an adverse reaction by the suspect; and, the suspect refuses to submit to arrest.”<sup>8</sup>

#### **Recommendations**

- SPD should develop a new policy focused on barricaded subjects. This policy should clearly define what constitutes a barricaded subject and offer officers specific guidance on how to make this determination.<sup>9</sup>
