1. The Seattle Police Department did not meet its burden of proving it had just cause to suspend Appellant Michael Chin for 15 days. The Commission therefore orders the Department to reverse the suspension and to make Appellant Chin financially whole for earnings and benefits he lost as a result of the suspension.

- 2. Appellant Chin met his burden of proving that the Department did not have just cause to transfer him from the Traffic Unit. The Commission therefore orders the Department to reassign Appellant Chin to the Traffic Unit and to make Appellant Chin financially whole for earnings and benefits he lost during the time period between the date the Department transferred him from the Traffic Unit until the date upon which the Department transfers Appellant Chin back into the Traffic Unit, including the average amount of on-duty overtime worked by other officers assigned to the Traffic Unit during that period.
- 3. The Commission concludes that the Department may, and indeed should, establish reasonable generally applicable controls regarding on-duty overtime.

 Such controls could include generally applicable mandatory reporting and/or policies establishing maximum overtime hours that may be worked during a particular period of time. However, in the absence of such generally applicable controls, the Department did not have just cause to impose discipline on Appellant Chin in the form of a mandatory overtime reporting requirement that applied only to him.

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
